"As I swore in my wrath,

although his works were finished from the foundation of the world. ⁴For he has somewhere spoken of the seventh day in this way: "And God rested on the seventh day from all his works." ⁵And again in this passage he said,

"They shall not enter my rest."

⁶Since therefore it remains for some to enter it, and those who formerly received the good news failed to enter because of disobedience, ⁷again he appoints a certain day, "Today," saying through David so long afterward, in the words already quoted,

"Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts."

⁸For if Joshua had given them rest, God would not have spoken of another day later on. ⁹So then, there remains a Sabbath rest for the people of God, ¹⁰for whoever has entered God's rest has also rested from his works as God did from his.

¹¹Let us therefore strive to enter that rest, so that no one may fall by the same sort of disobedience. ¹²For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. ¹³And no creature is hidden from his sight, but all are naked and exposed to the eyes of him to whom we must give account.



"Leaving All"
October 20 through October 26, 2024

For the next two weeks I want to familiarize you with Martin Luther. Martin was born November 10, 1483, in Eisleben and named for St. Martin of Tours (c.316-397), a monk bishop who was one of the most popular saints of the Middle Ages. Luther was a devout Romanist and yet was troubled by the question of how he might please God for the Roman system emphasized (and still does) man's works. While lecturing on the psalms at Wittenberg, Luther began to realize that one does not please God, rather God justifies men, that is, declares them righteous in His sight for the sake of His Son. The faithful stand in the heavenly court constantly with the Judge declaring them "not guilty." It was in the psalms that Luther found Christ. Indeed, every psalm is really about Christ and His Church so that it is about the individual Christian who has been joined to Christ also.

CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK: The Apostles' Creed

The Second Article: Redemption

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day He rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God, the Father Almighty. From thence He will come to judge the living and the dead.

What does this mean?

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord. Who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true.

Luther, Sermon on Luke 10:23-37, (September 3, 1531): In this Samaritan, Christ pictures and shows the kindness, help, and comfort which He provides in His kingdom through the Gospel; this is just what He initially spoke to His disciples: "Blessed are the eyes which see what you see," etc. [Luke 10:23]. He paints most comfortingly what faith has in Him and how very different His Gospel is from the teaching of the Law (which the priests and Levites also have). I have previously spoken about this abundantly. But in this picture, we need to look at how we have fallen into sin against God's commandment, lie under God's wrath, and must die eternal death--and at how we have been rescued by Him, so that we receive God's grace, comfort and life for our conscience and even begin to keep the Law. This is our chief article, the doctrine of faith, which tells us that we cannot help ourselves, nor can any works or teaching of the Law, but He must begin it in us. He does not drive us with the Law if we perceive our sins and misery (for that belongs to the secure spirits such as this scribe, who do not want to be called sinners), but He sincerely takes pity on us, befriends and comforts us through His Word,

Himself binds up the wounded, puts us on His animal, nurses and tends to us. He Himself had to carry out our redemption by Himself, take our place, and bear on His body our sins and need. He Himself also proclaims this to us and gives us the comforting words through which we are bandaged and healed. (*Church Postil V*, LW 79:62-63)

READINGS

Revelation 14:6-7 Romans 3:19-28 John 8:31-36

The Gospel for the Festival of the Reformation presents the central reason for the Reformation instituted by Martin Luther. Luther would express it well in the great hymn of the A Mighty Fortress: The Word they still shall let remain nor any thanks have for it. "If you abide in My Word." What did Jesus mean? The phrase "in the Word" has become popular, but Jesus said in My Word. Only the Word which comes from the mouth of the Father gives life. Christ, the Word of God, directs you to abide in His Word. That Word is not just a historical record of words which came from the Savior's mouth, but the powerful, life-creating Word which made the world in the beginning. To abide in the Word is to live in the baptismal word of life which Christ spoke over you for through baptism God opened your eyes to the truth which sets you free. To abide in the Word is to worship with your fellow saints in the public worship of the congregation. To abide in the Word is to confess the sin which bothers you and to receive absolution from the pastor as from Christ Himself for this is the truth which sets you free from the burden of shame and guilt. Finally, to abide in the Word is to receive the holy body and blood of Christ so that Christ, the Word of God, dwells in you and gives you life. Every opportunity to return to baptism or solidify this life in the Word is encouraged, i.e. the life of daily prayer. You were made sons when you were taken into the Word in baptism, brought into the house of the Father, that you might indeed be free forever.
