

THE CONGREGATION AT PRAYER FOR THE WEEK OF THE FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

"Do You Not Care?"
June 23 through June 29, 2024

How should I pray for true repentance and the restoration of the withering? True repentance is the way of faith which as it grows sees ever more clearly the sins of the flesh. True repentance is not just contrition, that is, sorrow over sin, it is also trusting in the Word of Christ's forgiveness, that is, absolution. The withering are those who absent themselves from the preaching of God's Word and are in danger of drying up and dying as they stay away from the life-giving waters of their baptism. As Jesus instructed His pastors to return the lost sheep, so we are to pray that those who have strayed would return to the Church and be restored to life. It is in worship that God showers His streams of living water upon His people. Everyone should pray for all the withering, yet those who have family members who are perishing should specifically recall them in prayer.

CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK: The Lord's Prayer The Fourth Petition

Give us this day our daily bread.

What does this mean?

God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What is meant by daily bread?

Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.

The Fifth Petition: And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.

What does this mean?

We pray in this petition that our Father in heaven would not look at our sins, or deny our prayer because of them. We are neither worthy of the things for which we pray, nor have we deserved them, but we ask that He would give them all to us by grace, for we daily sin much and surely deserve nothing but punishment. So we too will sincerely forgive and gladly do good to those who sin against us.

The Sixth Petition: And lead us not into temptation.

What does this mean?

God tempts no one. We pray in this petition that God would guard and keep us so that the devil, the world, and our sinful nature may not deceive us or mislead us into false belief, despair, and other great shame and vice. Although we are attacked by these things, we pray that we may finally overcome them and win the victory.

Luther, Sermon on Luke 19:41-48 (1525): Now you have often heard what the Word of God is, what it brings us, and what kind of scholars it has. Of all this nothing is said here. Only the punishment and distress which shall come upon the Jews because they would not recognize the time of their visitation, are here described. And let us well consider this, because the time of their visitation also deeply concerns us. If they are punished who do not know the time of their visitation, what will be done to those who maliciously persecute, blaspheme and disgrace the Gospel and the Word of God? However, here he only speaks of those who do not know it. There are two methods of preaching against the despisers of God's Word. The first is by threats, as Christ threatens them in Matt. 11:21-24: "Woe unto thee, Chorazin! Woe unto thee Bethsaida! For if the mighty works had been done in Tyre and Sidon which were done in you, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes. But I say unto you, it shall be more tolerable for Tyre and Sidon in the day of judgment than for you. And thou, Capernaum (which was his own

city, where he performed most of his mighty works), shalt thou be exalted unto heaven? Thou shalt go down unto hell; for if the mighty works had been done in Sodom which were done in thee, it would have remained until this day. But I say unto you that it shall be more tolerable for the land of Sodom in the day of judgment, than for thee." With these threatening words he would frighten them to their senses, and not to cast to the winds the Word which God sends them. The other method the Lord gives here when he weeps, and shows his sympathy for the poor blinded people, and rebukes and threatens them, not as the hardened and stubbornly blind; but when he melts in love and compassion over his enemies, and with great heart-rending pity and cries, he tells them what shall befall them, which he would gladly prevent, but all is in vain. In the passage just quoted, Matt. 11:21-24, where he rebukes them, he does not treat them in love, but in the severity of faith. However, here it is all sincere love and mercy. This is worthy of our consideration. First, as he approached the city they went before and followed him with songs of great joy, saying: "Hosanna to the Son of David!" and spread their garments in the way and cut branches from the trees and strewed them in the way; the whole scene was most glorious. But in the midst of all this joy he begins to weep. He permits all the world to be joyful, while he himself was bowed with grief, when he beheld the city and said: "If thou hadst known in this day, even thou, the things that belong unto peace! But now they are hid from thine eyes." (Sermons of *Martin Luther* 4:316-318)

READINGS

Lamentations 3:22-33 2 Corinthians 8:1-9,13-15 Mark 5:21-43

Jairus comes to Jesus while He is by the water for Christ offers life through the physical element of water in Holy Baptism by attaching His Word of promise. Jairus comes seeking not only Christ's Word, but a physical sign, the laying on of hands. The friends come to discourage Jairus for they doubt Christ's power to grant life, the power of the resurrection. Jesus counters them by appealing to faith. Faith trusts that Christ offers the resurrection of the dead through the work of His Holy Spirit. Death is only sleep until Christ wakes us in the resurrection of all flesh. Jesus restores the girl's life with His Word and physical touch. Today, Christ still brings life to us through His Word and physically touching us through the elements in the Sacrament, the body and blood of Christ. As this body of Christ bestowed the resurrection on the little girl, so it bestows life in our dead bodies. Now, as Paul writes in the Epistle, the riches Christ gives to us produce the generosity of giving in our own sinful flesh. Jeremiah speaks of faith which holds firm under the burden of the cross and waits patiently for the Lord's deliverance. As Jairus waited for the Lord, so you too must wait at times for the mercy of the Lord, but He will not cast you off forever.
