Though there is nothing to be gained by it, I will go on to visions and revelations of the Lord. <sup>2</sup>I know a man in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows. <sup>3</sup>And I know that this man was caught up into paradise—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows—<sup>4</sup> and he heard things that cannot be told, which man may not utter. <sup>5</sup>On behalf of this man I will boast, but on my own behalf I will not boast, except of my weaknesses. <sup>6</sup>Though if I should wish to boast, I would not be a fool, for I would be speaking the truth. But I refrain from it, so that no one may think more of me than he sees in me or hears from me. <sup>7</sup>So to keep me from being too elated by the surpassing greatness of the revelations, a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to harass me, to keep me from being too elated. 8Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this, that it should leave me. <sup>9</sup>But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. <sup>10</sup>For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong.

# THE CONGREGATION AT PRAYER FOR THE WEEK OF THE SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

"The Wisdom Given to Him" July 7 through July 13, 2024

The readings from 2 Samuel tell us of the mysteries of God who worked through King David. It begins with David's execution of the one who dared to kill Saul, the Lord's anointed. So Peter would speak of the blood of Christ being on those who dared to execute the Anointed One (Acts 3:14-15). David was asked to shepherd the people and rule over them. He would reign for forty years even as Christ would walk among His apostles for forty days after Easter. His thirty-three year reign in Jerusalem corresponds to the length of Christ's earthly life. The marching in the treetops is a foreshadowing of the great victory God accomplishes through His Son's death at the tree of the cross. Why was the man killed who touched the ark? God's presence was in the ark and no one may touch God without an intermediary. God comes to us in the flesh that He might then touch us through the means of water, bread, and wine. To touch Him in any other way than the means He has appointed is to die.

## **CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK: The Apostles' Creed**

**The First Article: Creation** 

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth.

#### What does this mean?

I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is most certainly true.

Luther, Large Catechism, Sixth Commandment: Let us, therefore, first of all note carefully how very highly God honors and extols married life by giving it His sanction and protection in the Ten Commandments. He sanctioned it earlier in the Fourth Commandment, "You shall honor your father and your mother." But here, as I said, He safeguards and protects it. Therefore, He wants to see it honored, upheld, and treated also by us as being divinely instituted and full of blessing. For He established it as the first one of all His institutions, and He created man and woman with obvious differences, not for wickedness, but that they may be and remain attracted to each other, be fruitful, have children, care for them, and bring them up to the glory of God. God has, therefore, most richly blessed marriage above all other estates. In addition, everything that the world contains He has assigned and devoted to providing marriage amply and richly with all that it needs. . . . Therefore, I have always taught that we should not look down upon marriage or undervalue it as the blind world and the false clergy are doing. We are rather to view it in the light of the Word of God, which adorns and sanctifies it. Marriage is not merely to be placed on a level with other estates; it is to be put ahead and above them all, whether that be emperor, princes, bishops, or anyone else. . . . Remember, in the second place, that marriage is not only an honorable but also a necessary estate, one that is solemnly commanded by God. In general, men and women of every circumstance, having been created for it, belong in marriage. . . . Where nature as implanted by God has its way, it is not possible to remain chaste except within

marriage. For flesh and blood remain flesh and blood, and the natural tendencies and attractions proceed without restraint or hindrance, as everyone can see and sense.

Therefore, in order that it might be easier to avoid unchastity in some measure, God has established marriage so that everyone may have his assigned portion and be happy with it, although even here the grace of God is needed to keep the heart pure. I am saying this in order that young people may be urged to acquire a love for married life and know that it is a blessed estate pleasing to God. Thus in time one might again turn the situation around to the point where marriage would again be honored and there would be a reduction of wild, disorderly conduct, such as is now everywhere prevalent in public prostitution and other disgraceful vices resulting from contempt for married life. Parents and civil authorities, therefore, have the duty of supervising the young so that they are brought up to live disciplined and respectable lives and, when they are grown, become honorably married in the fear of God. God will then add his blessing and grace so that people find joy and happiness in marriage. (*LC*, 46-47, St. Louis: Concordia, 1978)

#### READINGS

Amos 7:7-15 Ephesians 1:3-14 Mark 6:14-29

Christ sends His disciples out to preach repentance and the way of the Gospel. He sent them out with nothing that they might live upon those who heard the Word. They were to enter a house and stay there. So a pastor is called to one church and is not to steal the sheep of others or care for those who are someone else's flock. Those who refuse the message are judged by the dust being shaken from the apostle's foot for dust is the mark of death. The pastor is called to bring judgment and to separate by the preaching of the Word of God. The refusal to hear that Word will bring a harsher judgment than Sodom and Gomorrah experienced for they did not hear the preaching of the apostolic office. Pastors are not called to do what congregations want and their decisions are not subject to voting unless they have violated the Word of God. The rejection of Amos was a rejection of the one appointed by God and brought a harsh judgment upon Amaziah the priest and Israel. Congregations who do this are rejecting the shepherds of Christ and the pastor forced out must shake the dust from his feet. Amos points out that he was an ordinary man placed in the office of prophet by God. Pastors are ordinary men placed in the office by God. In their office they are God's mouthpiece while in their person they continue to be ordinary men. It is through the office of pastor that the Holy Spirit bestows the blessings of Christ upon the Church. There is no Church without the pastoral office which is why these readings appear under the discussion of the Third Article of the Creed in Pentecost.
