
Mark 5:21-43

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark, the fifth chapter.

C Glory to You, O Lord.

²¹When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered about Him, and He was beside the sea. ²²Then came one of the rulers of the synagogue, Jairus by name, and seeing Him, he fell at His feet ²³and implored Him earnestly, saying, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well and live." ²⁴And He went with him.

And a great crowd followed Him and thronged about Him. ²⁵And there was a woman who had had a discharge of blood for twelve years, ²⁶and who had suffered much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had, and was no better but rather grew worse. ²⁷She had heard the reports about Jesus and came up behind Him in the crowd and touched His garment. ²⁸For she said, "If I touch even His garments, I will be made well." ²⁹And immediately the flow of blood dried up, and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. ³⁰And Jesus, perceiving in Himself that power had gone out from Him, immediately turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched My garments?" ³¹And His disciples said to Him, "You see the crowd pressing around You, and yet You say, 'Who touched Me?'" ³²And He looked around to see who had done it. ³³But the



woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling and fell down before Him and told Him the whole truth. ³⁴And He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

³⁵While He was still speaking, there came from the ruler's house some who said, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the Teacher any further?" ³⁶But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the ruler of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." ³⁷And He allowed no one to follow Him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. ³⁸They came to the house of the ruler of the synagogue, and Jesus saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. ³⁹And when He had entered, He said to them, "Why are you making a commotion and weeping? The child is not dead but sleeping." ⁴⁰And they laughed at Him. But He put them all outside and took the child's father and mother and those who were with Him and went in where the child was. ⁴¹Taking her by the hand He said to her, "Talitha cumi," which means, "Little girl, I say to you, arise." ⁴²And immediately the girl got up and began walking (for she was twelve years of age), and they were immediately overcome with amazement. ⁴³And He strictly charged them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.

THE CONGREGATION AT PRAYER FOR THE WEEK OF THE SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

"Redeems both Body and Soul" June 30 through July 6, 2024

Currently, the daily catechism readings are taken from the fifth chief part, Confession. Luther organized the catechism so that the last three parts are how God gives His gifts and accomplishes His purposes in us. First, there is Baptism by which He calls us to faith and daily raises us up to new life. Then, there is confession. Luther spoke of three kinds of confession: before God, before neighbor, and before the pastor. The first two are to go on daily and be a central part of the Christian home. The third is a great gift to troubled consciences and is the subject of the fifth chief part of Luther's catechism. The objective of private confession is to direct the troubled conscience to the pastor's word of absolution for it is not the pastor's word, but Christ's. The pastor asks the penitent if he believes the word of Christ before absolving him. Luther referred to this as Holy Absolution and regarded it as the third sacrament of the Church for it has the promise of Christ as its power. Luther also used private confession to hear what individuals believed and instruct them in the truth. Children were admitted to the Sacrament after they could recite the catechism which their parents taught them and made their first confession to the pastor. Luther had no desire to see the rite of confirmation continue in the church. Luther included an order for private confession in the catechism.

CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK: The Lord's Prayer

The Seventh Petition: But deliver us from evil.

What does this mean?

We pray in this petition, in summary, that our Father in heaven would rescue us from every evil of body and soul, possessions and reputation, and finally, when our last hour comes, give us a blessed end, and graciously take us from this valley of sorrow to Himself in heaven.

The Conclusion: For Thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.

What does this mean?

This means that I should be certain that these petitions are pleasing to our Father in heaven, and are heard by Him; for He Himself has commanded us to pray in this way and has promised to hear us. Amen, amen means "yes, yes, it shall be so."

Luther, Large Catechism, Third Commandment: The plain sense of this commandment, then, is that since we observe holidays in any case, we should use them for learning God's Word. For the sake of young people and the neglected masses, the ministry of the Word should be the special concern of this day. However, the observance of the day of rest should not be so narrowly restrictive that it forbids incidental and unavoidable work. If, then, someone asks the meaning of "Thou shalt sanctify the holy day," then reply, "To sanctify the holy day means to keep it holy." But what is "keeping it holy?" It is nothing else than to reserve it for holy words, holy works, and holy living. For the day as such requires no sanctifying for it was created holy in itself. But God wants it to be holy for you. It is through you that it becomes holy or unholy depending on whether what you do on that day is holy or unholy. How, then, is such sanctifying accomplished? Not by sitting cozily in a corner and avoiding hard work, nor by decking oneself with flower garlands and putting on one's best clothes, but, as stated, by our being occupied with God's Word and putting it into practice. Indeed, we Christians ought to observe an ongoing holy day and be totally involved with holy things, that is, daily occupy ourselves with God's Word, carrying it in our hearts and on our lips. But because not everyone has the time and leisure for this, we must, as was pointed out, use several hours during the week for the young and at least one day of the week for the whole community, solely in order to focus on these things, especially on the Ten Commandments, the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer. In that way, our entire life and being will be under the direction of God's Word.

Be the time slot what it may, wherever there are such activities and exercises, there a true holy day is kept. Wherever these are lacking, it cannot be called a Christian holy day. . . . The treasure that sanctifies all things is the Word of God, by which the saints themselves were all sanctified. In whatever hour one uses, preaches, hears, reads, or thinks about God's Word, it sanctifies the person, his day, and his work, not because of the external act, but because of the Word that makes saints of us all. Therefore, I keep repeating that if our life and labor are to be God-pleasing or holy, they must be conducted in the light of the Word of God. Where that happens, there the Third Commandment is being observed according to its full intent. . . . So much depends on God's Word that without it no holy day is sanctified. We should, therefore, realize that God wants this commandment to be strictly kept and will punish all who despise God's Word and do not want to hear or learn it, especially at the times set aside for it. (*LC*, 26-28, St. Louis: Concordia, 1978)

READINGS

Ezekiel 2:1-5 2 Corinthians 12:1-10 Mark 6:1-13

People like to say that God works in mysterious ways, but they often want to overlook the real mysteries of God. The people of Jesus' own country are like this. They saw him as a carpenter, the Son of Mary. They did not see Him as the Sabbath who came to build up the household of the Church, laying Himself down as the chief Cornerstone. Yet, God always comes in humble means, whether that be in the flesh, in the waters of baptism, in the bread and wine of the Holy Supper, or through the mouth of the man ordained as your pastor. God only comes in glory to judge the living and the dead. All of this requires faith in the Word of God. The people did not recognize Jesus because they did not hear and believe the Words of the Old Testament Scriptures. Jesus preached on the Scriptures and did what they said of Him, but those who did not have ears to hear did not have eyes to see. As Jesus was without honor, so the pastor who returns to his home town or remains in one place a long time may be without honor. Do not forget that your pastor is the mouthpiece for God. Do not call him by his first name, but by his title, pastor, to honor him as God's servant in your midst. The reading from Ezekiel speaks of the rebellion of Israel against the prophet, but the Word of God always validates the word of the faithful prophet. One does not identify a faithful pastor by his friendliness or the harmony in his congregation. The Word of God is the only standard to be used. Paul reminds the pastor that real strength is in the recognition of his own weakness and Christ's grace.
