

*"Afraid to Ask Him"* September 22 through September 28, 2024

Most of you have some sort of prayer practice with your meals. The rush of modern society has caused us to neglect this very important and intimate time for the family. I encourage you to establish a time at which all of you eat together following the example of our Lord who spent much of His life in the intimate settings of meals. One way to define the meal is to frame it with prayer before and after. This will establish a rhythm and a sense of the importance of mealtime. Luther's catechism provides excellent suggestions of prayers before and after the meal. Before the meal you seek God's blessing and after the meal you offer thanks. In each case Luther provides bits of Scripture that you may memorize and recite as a family. In this way God provides the words for you to pray and instructs you in the faith.

**INVOCATION:** In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. **AMEN.**

### CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK: The Ten Commandments Review of the Commandments and the Close of the Commandments

What does God say about all of these commandments?

He says, "I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (*Exodus 20:5-6*)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

Luther, Large Catechism, Close of the Commandments: As stated earlier, included in the words of this appendix is both a threat of wrath to terrify and warn us and a friendly promise to attract us and to beckon to us to take in and prize God's words of command as being of divine seriousness. For He Himself here declares how intensely He is concerned about these commandments and how strictly He will watch for our observance of them. He points out how fearfully and terribly He will punish all who scorn and violate them, and again how richly He will reward, bless, and grant all manner of good things to those who value them highly and gladly live and act according to them. Thus He requires that all our actions should proceed from a heart that reverently fears God and looks to Him alone, and because of such reverent fear avoids everything that is against His will lest He be angered. Conversely, He demands a heart that trusts only in Him, and for the love of Him does what He wants because He proves Himself to be such a kind father and offers us His every grace and blessing. Precisely, this is also the sense and right interpretation of the first and chief commandment, the fountainhead of all the other commandments. ... Scripture has preached and urged this commandment everywhere, focusing everything on these two elements: fear of God and trust in God. ... Thus the First Commandment is to illumine all the others and share its splendor with them. In order that it may be constantly repeated and never forgotten, let it run through all the commandments like the wire frame

or hoop that runs through a wreath, joining the end to the beginning and holding everything together. ... Such fear, love, and trust in Him should drive us and draw us not to despise His Word, but learn it, hear it gladly, keep it holy, and honor it. ... It is helpful and necessary always to instruct, encourage, and remind young people concerning these things, so that they may be brought up not just with blows and coercion like cattle, but in the fear and reverence of God. These directions are not human trifles but the commandments of the Most High God. He watches over them with great and earnest care, and His wrath flames out to punish those who disdain them. On the other hand, He lavishly rewards those who keep them. Where people ponder this and take it to hearts, there the urge and impulse gladly to do the will of God will arise spontaneously. (*LC*, 64-66, St. Louis: Concordia, 1978)

#### READINGS

I am going to depart from commenting on next week's Gospel so that I might address the feast of St. Michael and All Angels that falls on September 29. The angels were created by God to be His messengers and to serve men. Angels are spirits, that is, they are personal beings who have no bodies. The good angels are those who serve God, but the evil angels are those who rebelled against God at soon after Creation. The chief of the evil angels is called Satan or Lucifer or the Devil. St. Michael is the archangel who leads God's angels into battle with the demons, that is, the evil angels. Some have the false notion that men become angels after death, but the Scriptures are clear that angels are one creature and men are another. When Jesus rose from the dead, he rose in the flesh and you will rise in the flesh also. I encourage you to give thanks that day for the holy angels who watch over all who are baptized into Christ, for these angels always see the face of the Father in heaven.
